6W Class Assembly

On Wednesday, 6W shared their class assembly with siblings, parents and carers. We celebrated Black History Month by shining a spotlight on the incredible achievements of the Hidden Figures: four remarkable African-American women who made history and broke boundaries in the world of science and space exploration. Our assembly highlighted the importance of recognising the wonderful contributions made by people from African and Caribbean descent and how they have helped shape the world we live in today.



Remembrance Visit

Year 6 had an exciting opportunity this week to be taken on a journey back to World War One with a visit from Scott Green; an artefact and memorabilia collector and WWI and II enthusiast. The children were able to explore various pieces of memorabilia, each with a unique and fascinating story straight from the battlefields of the First World War. Scott shared his own experiences of visiting Somme and Flanders Fields, where he himself stumbled upon artefacts still lying in the place where soldiers fell. All of the children were fascinated with the various artefacts and stories he had to share, giving the children further insight to consolidate their History learning on World War Two.

Author Visit - Lucy Moreland

This week, we were delighted to host local author, Lucy Moreland. In assembly, Lucy read her story: 'The Phone Away Day' to all of the children in the school and asked them to consider what interesting activities they might get up to if they were not allowed to be on a screen for a day. We had some great responses, from visiting a local park to playing with Lego. For our older children, Lucy then ran a workshop to help inspire their creative writing and even answered a few questions from our Reading Ambassadors. This week we have been learning...

Reception	<p>This week the Reception children started their week going on a bear hunt which linked to our story this week. The children found clues around the school and used key vocabulary from the book such as over, under and through to navigate their way around the school. From this we went on an adventure to the lighthouse to create a map of our bear hunt. In our outside area the children have enjoyed using the puppet theatre to retell the story and recreate the hunt. In maths we have been focussing on numbers 1-5. The children have been learning all the number bonds that make up each number.</p> <p>Phonics: Recap all phase 3 words Tricky words: the</p>
Year 1	<p>This week we enjoyed our author visit for phone away day and we wrote postcards about screen free things we would like to do! In maths we have been subtracting using part whole models and number lines. We have tried so hard remembering all the movements in our dance this week, well done year 1. In RE we have been talking about Harvest and what we can do to give back to our community. We loved singing our Harvest songs in assembly. Have a brilliant half term break from the year 1 team!</p> <p>Phonics: We have been recapping our alternate sounds "ai/ ay" "ou/ ow" and "oy/ oi" Tricky words: Phase 3 tricky words</p>
Year 2	<p>This week in Year 2 we enjoyed our author visit and have written postcards home about our ideas for our own Phone Away Days. Also, we have finished learning our first dance focussed on the continent of Europe, and have begun learning our second dance from the continent of Asia.</p> <p>Reviewing sounds: 'ti' 'si' 'ture' 'y' 'ie' 'ea'</p>
Year 3	<p>After a very exciting author visit, Year 3 was inspired to put our gadgets away and take learning to the Lighthouse where children made human pictograms as part of this week's learning on graphs. The children have collected various data from their friends, from transport to school to favourite holiday destinations and have found different ways to represent results. In Literacy, we have come to the end of 'Charlotte's Web' and recapped our learning from our 'Farm to Fork' topic. We wish you all a restful half term and look forward to seeing the children again in Autumn Term 2.</p> <p>Spellings: actual, bicycle, answer, circle, enough, earth, fruit, island, often, popular.</p>
Year 4	<p>This week, Year 4 has finished reading our core text, The Iron Man. The children have created a book review about the text and an exciting conversation using dialogue between the Iron Man and the Space-Bat-Angel-Dragon. In DT, we created our own light up Iron Man figure, using our circuit knowledge from our science learning this term. In Maths, we have been continuing on our topic of multiplication, progressing to short term multiplication. We look forward to Year 4 returning next term for Autumn Term 2!</p> <p>Spellings: Continuing to practise our Year 3 and 4 Common Exception Words.</p>
Year 5	<p>This week, Year 5 have been thinking in further detail about Black History Month, and researching a number of influential black women to write about during Literacy lessons. In Maths, we have been learning about timetables, and considering all the ways timetables are used to keep our society running, such as trains, schools and even television scheduling. In Computing, we have continued to program our own Space themed games using Scratch, and the children have been learning to debug any errors in their coding whilst doing so.</p> <p>Spellings: Words with the suffix -ial and -ially: initial, initially, provincial, commercial, commercially, spatial, financial, financially, palatial, controversially.</p>
Year 6	<p>This week, Year 6 reflected on the great achievements of influential British black women - conducting their own research to write up a detailed biography during our Literacy lessons. In Maths, we completed our new learning on long division and began to revise our knowledge of fractions ready for our new topic next half term. On Tuesday, the children were able to finally construct their own lighthouses using our Power or Reading text: 'Letters from the Lighthouse' as inspiration as well as merging their understanding of series circuits in electricity.</p> <p>Spellings: Words that can be nouns and verbs. For example: produce, impact, transport, contest, increase</p>

Did you know that your pumpkin could generate power?



In Spelthorne we recycle food waste to generate electricity and make fertiliser.

Every year about 8 million pumpkins are thrown away after Halloween – that's a lot of electricity that could have been generated!

To recycle your pumpkin after Halloween put it out with your food waste bin on your collection day, it doesn't need to be bagged up, just put it on top of the bin.

If you don't yet use our food waste recycling service, don't worry, you can still put your pumpkin out on top of your normal bin and we will collect and recycle it.

Why not think about giving food recycling a go? It's a free collection that goes every week and we even give you the bins for free too!
