Year 5 River Walk

This week, as part of our rivers topic, Year 5 have had a wonderful time visiting Penton Hook Lock and walking along the river. We were able to see a range of human and physical features and

consolidate the knowledge taught during our Geography sessions. We investigated the course of the river, erosion, the flow of the river and many of its features (such as floodplains, deposits, pollution, sediments, meandering, tributaries and oxbows). The children modelled green choices throughout, were respectful towards pedestrians and asked brilliant questions.

Nut Free School

We would like to remind you that Echelford is a nut free school. Please do not give your child any food that contains nuts. This includes Nutella, pesto, cereal bars, peanut butter, chicken satay etc. If you are unsure, we would be grateful if you could check the ingredients before you pack their lunches and snacks.

Healthy Snack for Break Time

All children are welcome to bring a healthy snack to school to eat during their break time. These should be in as little packaging as possible because we're also keen to reduce our use of plastics (e.g. no bear yoyos or fruit winders).

These snacks are limited to:

- Fresh Fruit
- Fresh Vegetables
- Dried Fruit
- Plain rice cakes
- Bread sticks
- Yoghurt tube
- Plain crackers
- Pitta bread or Wraps (with no filling)

If children come into school with something that is not on the list, it will be sent back home. No cutlery should be brought in. A reminder that only Reception and Key Stage 1 children are provided daily fruit or vegetables as part of the Government scheme.

This week we have been learning...

Reception	This week we have been exploring letter writing through our story of the Jolly Postman. We've been practising our prediction strategies and story ordering and have even practised writing our very own letters to the Jolly Postman inviting him to visit our school! We've also been looking at world explorers and have focused on Nirmal Purja who climbed the 14 of the highest mountains in the world! We've been investigating part-part-wholes and found that these models can be found all around in the world around us, from our bodies, our faces, pens and pen lids and puzzle pieces! Phonics: sh, th, ng, nk spelling words: fix, fill, jam, leg, bell, dad, mess, bag, wet, duck
Year 1	This week we have been practising our songs and actions for our Christmas show. We are very excited to show you soon! We finished reading our book 'The Secret Sky Garden' and we wrote a book review about it. In maths we have been making number lines using numbers 1- 20. In science we have been testing how we can change different materials by squashing, twisting, stretching and bending. We have also started to learn how to type on a keyboard in computing, starting with our own names. Phonics: e_e (ee), ew (yoo/ oo), ie (ee), aw (or), Tricky words: house, mouse, water, want
Year 2	This week we have been extending our knowledge of Antarctica and The Arctic to understand Climate Change and how it is affecting our planet. In Literacy we have been writing a letter of concern to our local MP Kwasi Kwarteng that explains what we feel he should be doing to help the local environment. The children came up with ideas such as more bus routes to reduce people driving their own cars, more charging points for electric cars and planting more trees around Heathrow. Mrs Barber has posted them and we will await a response. Bridge to Spelling: This week we have looked at the different ways to spell 'c' and that after a short vowel sound there is usually 'ck'. For example shock, quick, crack and check.
Year 3	Year 3 took a deep dive into the world of crocodiles this week! The children spent time in Literacy researching them on the iPads and in books and have then written detailed fact files with headings and subheadings. The children then presented these to each other to practise their oracy skills. In Maths, we have been looking at column subtraction to take 3 digit numbers away from 3 digit numbers. In PSHE, we looked at how to deal with conflict with our family and friends effectively using the 'solve it

	together' technique. There has been lots of beautiful singing as we rehearse our songs for the Christmas concert. Spellings: To spell words where `-ing', `-er' and `-ed' are added to multisyllabic words. For example: covered, listening, gardener.
Year 4	This week, Year 4 have been continuing to explore their Power of Reading book Varjak Paw and have been writing narratives based on Varjak's experience in the outside world and the things he might come across. They have been ensuring that they include pronouns in their writing to avoid repetition. In maths, we have finished our unit of discrete data and have been learning how to interpret and construct time graphs. In History, we have discovered artefacts that were believed to be from Ancient Mesopotamia and thought about how they might have been used in that time period. Spellings: Pronouns : he, him, his, her, she, they, them, man, woman, women
Year 5	This week, Year 5 have enjoyed writing speeches from the perspective of Dooby, considering the different features that powerful and effective speeches have so that they can implement these into their writing. In Maths, we have been solidifying our understanding of short and long multiplication, and are beginning to delve into short division. Year 5 have also really enjoyed going on their river walks this week, and also completing presentations about different rivers around the world. Spellings: Words with the ending -ance or -ancy: abundancy, dominancy, brilliance, vacancy, elegance, hesitancy, relevancy, abundance, tolerance, extravagance.
Year 6	This week, in Maths, Year 6 have developed their knowledge of 'angles' and being able to use their known facts in supporting them in problem solving and reasoning. In Music, we listen to and explored a range of musical accompaniments from 'The Beatles' and 'The Isley Brothers'; drawing up our own comparisons using musical elements to develop our explanations. Singing rehearsals have also been underway for our Christmas Concert. Spellings: Words with the prefix: '-dis', '-un', '-over' and '-im'. For example: dissatisfied, unnatural, overreact, impatient.

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- measles outbreaks happen when not enough children have been vaccinated
- measles can be a very serious disease, leading to ear and chest infections, fits, diarrhoea, and damage to the brain. Measles can kill
- your child is at risk of measles if he or she hasn't had the MMR vaccination
- 2 doses of MMR vaccine are needed to get the best protection
- if your child is due to have had 2 doses of MMR but has not yet received them, no matter what age they are, you should contact your GP to get them vaccinated as soon as possible*
- if you can't remember if your child has had any, 1 or 2 doses of MMR vaccine, check his or her personal child health record (the Red Book). If this doesn't help, speak to your GP
- if you don't know how many doses your child has had, it's better to have 2 doses of MMR vaccine now rather than risk leaving them unprotected

*In response to a local outbreak then the 2 doses can be given one month apart from the age of 18 months.

Why are we seeing these outbreaks of measles?

Measles is a highly infectious disease, spreading quickly from person to person, especially in schools. A child with measles will infect almost all unprotected children they have contact with. Since the end of 2017 there has been an increase in measles globally which has affected the UK. This has resulted in some spread into wider communities, in particular in undervaccinated groups.

When are the MMR vaccinations usually given?

The best times are between 12 and 13 months of age and again at 3 years and 4 months, with one dose on each occasion. But, if your child wasn't vaccinated then, they can be vaccinated at any age with 2 doses one month apart.

Surrey County Council encourages residents to offer Supported Lodgings/foster

Supported Lodgings, and Fostering are both incredibly rewarding experiences that can transform the lives of both the children/young people being supported and the carers' themselves. Children and young people who enter the care system have often experienced trauma and instability in their lives, and a stable and supportive carer family can make a significant difference in their wellbeing and development. Nationally, there are currently over 70,000 children living with carer families in the UK. However, there is still a significant shortage of Supported Lodgings and foster carers, with around 9,265 new carer families needed in the next year alone. In Surrey, there are over 1,000 children in care and Surrey County Council have just under 400 carer families.

Supported Lodgings is targeted at young adults aged 16-21 to help them build their independence skills ready to live independently in the future, from the security of a caring, stable home environment.

Supported Lodgings Carers and Foster carers come from all walks of life and backgrounds, and there is no one-size-fits-all approach to caring. Whether you are single or married, young or old, own your own home or rent, you can still become a carer. The most important thing is a willingness to provide a safe and loving home for a child in need.

This is the message that Surrey County Council is promoting in national recruitment film 'Any of Us'. The short film has been jointly funded by over 80 councils across England and aims to raise awareness about fostering, particularly among those people who may not have previously considered themselves suited to caring for vulnerable children and young people. The film looks at the potential of three people from different backgrounds to become carers, and the potential of children they care for to grow and thrive. 'Any of Us' is available to watch from the 26th September. If you have ever thought about fostering, or offering Supported Lodgings, now is the time to take that first step and find out more. The more people who consider caring, the greater the chance of finding loving, stable homes for children in Surrey who desperately need them.
